


School Wide Summer Reading

What the Eyes Don't See, A Story of Crisis, Resistance, and Hope in an American City



The book chronicles Dr. Mona's relentless pursuit to uncover the contamination of Flint, Michigan's drinking water, which would lead to her testifying in front of Congress. Gripping and emotional, Dr. Mona's personal account reads like a scientific thriller as she vividly recounts the effects lead poisoning had on her young patients and the evidence she gathered to share with the world.

Our hope is that this title will unify our school community as we engage in conversations surrounding this book across content areas, as it relates to themes in science, social studies and English.

- 1 Create a soundtrack for text.** Choose 7-10 songs that you would pair with the novel and explain how each song selection fits with a particular event in the text.
- 2 Create a written or video review of the novel,** celebrating the author's strengths in achieving her purpose and providing thoughtful suggestions for improvement.
- 3 Compose an interview with a selected character.** Craft 10 questions to ask this character and write responses based on your understand of the character.
- 4 Create a "story box"** for the text that you will with objects that have symbolic meaning to the text as a whole. Label each object with an explanation of significance.
- 5 Create a digital newspaper for your book.** Summarize the plot in one article, cover the weather in another, do a feature story on one of the more interesting characters in another. Include an editorial and a collection of ads that would be pertinent to the story.
- 6 Compose an original sequel** to the story while maintaining the author's style.

All students that complete one of the options will be invited to a celebration in late September and entered for prizes!
